In Christ alone we find our true identity.

"Indeed, I count everything as loss because of the surpassing worth of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For His sake I have suffered the loss of all things and count them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ." – Philippians 3:8

At the National Youth Gathering of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod July 16-20, our Bible study focused on St. Paul's short letter to the Philippians. We were encouraged to read through the 4 short chapters each day.

One morning, our Bible study leader asked us to complete the following statement: "I am...." I listed "...a Christian, a husband, a father, a son, a pastor, a Lutheran, an American." A few minutes later, he asked us to take a more personal look at ourselves and add to the list of things "I am...." I listed some neutral things, some things I'm trying to accomplish, and some challenges I'm working on. Again, a third time, he asked us to add to the list of things "I am..." some things that occur only in our minds – private things known only to God.

Have you ever made such a list? We tend to describe ourselves by outward things that the world sees. We describe ourselves internally by our goals and desires – the things we take pride or shame in. And if we're honest, we confess to God things known only by Him.

In Philippians 3 Paul shares his list. He lists things about himself that are positive, neutral and negative – all things that were part of Paul's identity *without Christ*. All these identity markers – positive, neutral and negative – Paul counted as rubbish compared with knowing Christ. Everything *apart* from Christ is nothing, and will pass away. Paul knew that his righteousness (and our righteousness) comes through faith in Jesus Christ alone.

Our true identity is in Christ. Our struggles in this world can be very tough, but the struggles of our earthly circumstances no longer define us. Instead, our identity all depends on faith in Him – "that I may know Him and the power of His resurrection, and may share His sufferings, becoming like Him in His death, that by any means possible I may attain the resurrection from the dead." (Philippians 3:10-11)

The power of Jesus' resurrection changes us, now and into eternity. Through Holy Baptism, His resurrection is our resurrection. Through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus, we poor, miserable sinners have been declared "saints" by grace alone in baptism. This is now our indelible identity forever. So with Paul we are bold to say, "For me to live is Christ, and to die is gain." (Philippians 1:21)

I encourage you to read Paul's letter to the Philippians. Read it as Jesus' letter to you. As you do, the Lord will work in your life, transforming your mind to be like Christ's. Pray that you may receive the fullness of His joy in all circumstances and live a life worthy of the Gospel, for your righteousness is through faith in Christ alone. You will discover that, in Christ, you are "more you, not less you."

Why We Do What We Do: CONFESSION and ABSOLUTION (or "coming clean" with God)

Confession has two parts. First, that we confess our sins, and second, that we receive absolution, that is, forgiveness, from the pastor as from God Himself, not doubting, but firmly believing that by it our sins are forgiven before God in heaven. – Luther's Small Catechism

In the Confession of the Divine Service we publicly confess or acknowledge all our sins, even those of which we are unaware (Psalms 19:12; 32:3,5; 51:1-4; Proverbs 28:13; 1 John 1:8-9). As Lutherans, we believe that private confession to the pastor of those sins which particularly trouble our hearts (2 Samuel 12:13; Matthew 9:12; James 5:16), although a wholesome practice, is a matter of Christian liberty, free from coercion.


In the Absolution, our pastor, who has been called by the Holy Spirit to act in this time and place by this congregation and has been ordained for this purpose, announces God's grace and forgiveness as from God Himself, by Christ's command (Matthew 18:18; Luke 10:16; John 20:19-23; see also Isaiah 1:18). When a called and ordained minister is not present, the leader simply declares that God forgives us through Jesus Christ (John 1:12; Philippians 1:6).

At Holy Cross, after the congregation invokes the name of the Triune God, our pastor leads the congregation in preparing to come before our holy God. When the Confession is placed at this point in the service, it reminds us of God's instruction to Moses to remove his sandals before drawing near to God (Exodus 3:4-6). Likewise, if able, we stand in reverence to God's holiness as we "come clean" before Him. To emphasize its preparatory nature, our pastor leads the Confession and Absolution from a place outside and lower than the altar area; only after the announcement of God's forgiveness of our sins does the pastor (and congregation) "enter" God's holy presence.

Occasionally the Confession is placed after the Sermon in a service with Holy Communion. It then accents our public, general confession with the Fifth Petition of the Lord's Prayer ("Forgive us our trespasses...") as we examine ourselves in preparation for the Lord's Supper and as we remember our Lord as He commanded in the Sacrament.

Although it is not strictly necessary to precede Holy Communion with Confession and Absolution, it is important to receive the Sacrament worthily. The Apostle Paul writes: Whoever, therefore, eats the bread or drinks the cup of the Lord in an unworthy manner will be guilty concerning the body and the blood of the Lord. Let a person examine himself, then, and so eat of the bread and drink of the cup. For anyone who eats and drinks without discerning the body eats and drinks judgment upon himself. – 1 Corinthians 11:27-29 Therefore, Confession helps us examine ourselves before the Lord's Supper to see if: A) we are sorry for our sins (Psalm 38:18; 2 Corinthians 7:10-11); B) we believe in our Savior Jesus Christ and His words in the Sacrament (Luke 22:19-20; 2 Corinthians 13:5), C) we are united in what we believe (Acts 2:42; 1 Corinthians 10:17 and 11:26; Romans 16:17), and D) we intend, with the Holy Spirit's help, to change our sinful lives (Ephesians 4:22-24). Although the pastor has the greatest responsibility as to who should be admitted to the Sacrament (1 Corinthians 4:1-2), the congregation and each communicant also bear some responsibility. Public confession aids us in this.

2017 BENEVOLENCE UPDATE:


As many of you already know, the Council has been working on a procedure (or policy) for our church's tithe. In the June Voters Meeting, we went over the rough draft of our Guidelines. Since then, the Council has approved the attached Policy for evaluating the recipients of our giving.

The full policy is in the attached /pdf file, but the "meat" of the matter is below. We tried to include our "rationale" on the front end of each rule, but our overarching guidance was that since you all are donating money to our Lutheran Church, the expectation would be that the donation would go do the work of, and to the Glory of, our Lord and Savior.

So we will be using these guidelines to "vet" our current recipients, and in at the December's Voters Meeting we expect to be presenting a modified list of benevolences; but it's not too late. So if someone sees a flaw in our logic, or has questions or concerns, please feel free to see any Elder our Council member. Thanks for your consideration and we look forward to healthy discussions.

General Guidelines

- 1. We believe that money donated to our church is intended for use in "Christian missions", e.g. missions commanded by Jesus, (works of corporal mercy and works of spiritual mercy).
- 2. We believe that whenever possible, benevolences should be done with all glory going to God, not to the recipient organization, or man. (e.g. Organization that do their work in the name of Jesus Christ.)
 - a. Further, whenever possible organizations within the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod should be supported in preference to other Christian based organizations.
- 3. In order to make our benevolences significant, we should avoid redundancy with overlapping missions/ organizations.
- 4. We believe that we have a responsibility to support our Synod (as it supplies the resources to maintain our denomination from generation).
- 5. We believe that there should be consideration to direct our benevolences locally, nationally, and internationally.
- 6. We believe that when all else is equal, the efficiency of the recipient organization should be used as a discriminating factor.
- 7. In order to make our benevolence impactful, we believe that we should keep the number of Holy Cross benevolences at 10 or less.
- 8. There are other ways to support organizations besides tithing from the regular offering; so these should be brought to the Church Council on a case by case basis, and are not subject to the limitations of these guidelines.
 - b. The ancillary support of other organizations should not be counted against these organizations in determination of benevolence eligibility
